Project Profile

Dawson Promise, Glendive MT

In the shadow of Makoshika State Park in Glendive, Montana you'll find Dawson Community College, home of Dawson Promise, a unique program that is part of Montana's Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program. Dawson Promise is a program aimed at helping youth aging out of the foster care system, unaccompanied youth, or youth experiencing homelessness obtain a twoyear education without debt. Through Dawson Promise, students are provided opportunities that may have previously seemed out of reach.

Dawson Promise works in partnership with each student to ensure they have the resources and support they need to reach their educational goals, while also developing additional life skills to set them up for sustainable success. Each participant is provided with year-round on-campus housing, access to food and various wrap-around services including one-on-one mentoring, academic tutoring, resume writing and more. Through a partnership with One Health School-Based Health Care, all program participants have access to primary care and behavioral health services on campus.

Dawson Promise is the only program of its kind in Montana with participants from Lambert to Victor, and Lame Deer to Kalispell. Since its inception, Dawson Promise has had a total of eight college graduates. Four students have continued their education at a 4-year institution, and four have entered the workforce in the areas of welding, criminal justice, and graphic design.

Each year, the program provides an opportunity for approximately 14 individuals to begin their postsecondary education free from financial burden.

Continuum of Care Updates

Continuum of Care brings Home over \$5 million in Grants to Address Homelessness in Montana

The Montana Continuum of Care Coalition was awarded \$5,501,085 in funding from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for projects throughout the state to address homelessness. "We are very excited to get funding for three new projects in Great Falls, Helena and Bozeman," said David O'Leary, executive director of the Continuum of Care, "as well as renewing all our current projects in Billings, Bozeman, Butte, Great Falls, Hamilton, Helena, Kalispell, Missoula, Browning, and Glendive." Jim McGrath, president of the MT CoC board stated, "We got everything we applied for and then some," and that "In my experience that is nearly an impossible achievement. It is unprecedented. It's a real coup for Montana and our homeless neighbors."

Partnership with the Training Institute

The Montana Continuum of Care Coalition is partnering with the Training Institute at People Incorporated to bring a web-based curriculum in best practices to Montana. Sessions will be open to all housing and service providers in the State of Montana and attendees will receive certificates upon successful completion of each session. Sessions dates are:

July 11: Principles of Housing First & Harm Reduction, 1-3pm August 8: Motivational Interviewing, 1-3pm September 12: De-escalation, 1-3pm

Participant Story

In May 2023 Dawson Promise participant Angelo was close to leaving college to help his girlfriend Erin in Billings, who suddenly found herself on the verge of homelessness. Wanting to support Angelo in his effort to help Erin, Dawson Promise program advisor Daneen Peterson worked with Angelo and Erin on a "a clever, outside-the-box solution." That solution was Dawson Promise. Though Erin hadn't completed high school graduation requirements, she was able to enroll at DCC under the Admissions acceptance category called Ability to Benefit (ATB) which allows students without a high school diploma or equivalency to receive postsecondary education and training while working toward HiSET completion. While ATB is rarely used as students cannot receive federal financial aid, Dawson Promise was able to cover Erin's room and board and college tuition for 10 weeks while she completed HiSET requirements.

Peterson says, "On December 14, Erin finished her first two college courses and the next day, she completed her HiSET! She's enrolled as a full-time student at DCC this spring semester and working toward her Associate of Arts degree, with the goal of attending Architecture School in the future. Erin will have the opportunity to walk DCC's commencement ceremony this May with other DCC Career and Adult Education Center graduates."

The Montana Department of Commerce announced nearly \$5 million of grant funding has been allocated to 10 non-profit organizations to support homeless shelters with new construction, capital improvements and shelter space acquisition for Montanans who are experiencing homelessness. The funding is through Commerce's Emergency Shelter Facility Grant (ESFG) Program. The ESFG is one-time funding opportunity authorized by HB5 in the 2023 Legislative Session.

HMIS Updates

2023 Systems Performance Measures


2023 System Performance Measure outcomes saw a decline from 2022. Measure 1 (Length of Time Homeless) demonstrated the starkest contrast increasing from an average of 93 (bed nights) in 2022 to an average of 160 in 2023; a more than 72% increase.

The CoC did see improvement in some other areas. Measure 4 (Employment and Income Growth) for CoC funded projects increased in 4 out of 6 categories. The percentage of participants who stayed (stayers) in projects during the report period with increased earned income increased from 7% in 2022 to 12% in 2023. Stayers also increased non employment cash income from a rate of 34% in 2022 to just under 40% in 2023. The most significant improvement was for the percentage of stayers who increased total income: 39% of stayers increased total income in 2022 compared to 49.6% in 2023. Lastly, Measure 7 (Exits to Permanent Housing) increased from 95% in 2022 to 98% in 2023.

HMIS User Survey

As part of the Statewide CES Evaluation the Coalition will be sending out a survey to all HMIS users in Montana. The survey is expected to be released in early May. The Coalition is seeking user feedback on HMIS performance and overall user experience.

The survey will assist the Coalition in understanding the challenges and successes you experience as HMIS stakeholders and set priorities for the upcoming year.



Why Measure System Performance?

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act shifted the focus of measuring the effectiveness of homeless services from evaluating programs operating independently within in a community, to evaluating them as a broad, coordinated system of homeless response. This means that Continua of Care must regularly measure their progress in meeting the needs of people experiencing homelessness throughout the continuum and report this progress annually to HUD.

YHDP Updates

Youth Action Board Receives Grant

The Montana Youth Action Board received a \$7500 grant from the Headwaters Foundation to support their work in 2024. This is the second year the Headwaters Foundation has supported the work of the YAB. The funds support YAB members by providing for opportunities in leadership development and providing stipends as compensation for their time.

YHDP Roundtables

YHDP Roundtables have resumed following a brief hiatus in late 2023. The roundtables serve as an opportunity for YHDP grantees to network and problem-solve, as well as receive regular updates from the Coalition. YHDP Roundtables take place via Zoom on the second Tuesday of each month at 11 am. YHDP Grants and the 2024 NOFO

As the release date of the FY2024 NOFO draws near it is important to know that YHDP grants will once again be non-competitive and will automatically renew for FY2024. YHDP grantees will still be required to complete an e-snaps Renewal Project application.

HUD Happenings On Saturday, March 9 President Biden signed into law a bill providing funding for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2024. Included was an increase of \$418 million for HUD's Homeless Assistance Grants (including Continuum of Care, Emergency Solutions Grants, and other miscellaneous programs). This marks the second year in a row with increases of over \$400 million.
